BIBLE READING DAY 25, WEDNESDAY: MARCH 23

Mission of the Seventy,

Luke 10:1-12, 16-20; Matthew 11:21-24

Now after these things, the Lord chose seventy others and sent them on before him, two by two, into every town and district where he himself was about to come. And he said to them, "The harvest truly is abundant, but the reapers are few. Pray therefore the Lord of the harvest to send out reapers into his harvest. Go your way. Behold, I am sending you forth as lambs among wolves. Do not carry a purse, or a bag for provisions, or an extra pair of sandals, and do not stop to exchange greetings with anyone along the way. Into whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace be to this house.' And if a son of peace is there, your peace shall rest upon him; and if not, it shall return to you. Stay in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer is worthy of his wages. Do not move from house to house.

"Whatever town you enter where the people receive you, eat whatever is set before you, heal the sick, and say to the people, 'The kingdom of God has come near you.' But whatever town you enter where the people do not receive you, go out into the streets and say, 'Even the dust of your town which clings to our feet, we wipe off as a protest against you. Nevertheless, be sure of this: the kingdom of God has come near you.' I say to you, it will be better for Sodom in the day of judgment than for that town.

"Alas for you, Chorazin! Alas for you, Bethsaida! For if the mighty works done in you had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes. But I say to you, it will be more tolerable for Tyre and Sidon in the day of judgment than for you! And you, Capernaum, are you to be exalted to heaven? You shall be brought down to hell! For if the mighty works which have been done in you had been done in Sodom, it would have remained to this day. But I say to you, it will be more tolerable for the land of Sodom in the day of judgment than for you!"

Then said Jesus to the seventy, "He who listens to you listens to me, and he who rejects you rejects me, and he who rejects me rejects the Father who sent me."

And the seventy returned with joy, saying, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us in your name!"

Then said Jesus, "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Behold, I have given you authority to tread on serpents and scorpions and over all the power of the enemy, and nothing can harm you in any way. Nevertheless, do not rejoice that the spirits are subject to you; but instead, rejoice that your names are written in heaven."

DEVOTIONAL DAY 25 (WEDNESDAY MARCH 23)

Three Reactions

Based on Luke 10:38-42

1.) Mary's Response: (vs. 39)

We don't know what is happening with Mary during this time. But I'm sure that she struggled with something. I'm sure that she probably dealt with brokenness and struggled with personal sin. But notice what she did. She sat in stillness and listened. She sought peace during turmoil.

It is the word 'listen' that should stand out to you. This means that she not only heard what Jesus said but that she was also processing those words. When we listen, we begin to think how to apply the information that we have heard. Mary sat and listened to what Christ was teaching. By listening to Christ, we gain an understanding of how to move through the brokenness of our lives.

2.) Martha's Response: (vs. 40)

Martha allows Christ to enter but then chooses to work rather than listen to what Christ has to say. The Greek verb for the word "distracted" means to "draw away". The MSG Bible says, "She was pulled away by all she had to do." One might conclude that Martha bottled up the real problem and distracted herself from Christ's teaching by distracting herself with busy work.

Questions to consider:

- 1.) What things, even good things, do we allow to pull us away from Jesus?
- 2.) How often do we do busy work to hide our struggles?
- 3.) Jesus's Response: (vs. 41-42)

"Martha, Martha." This rebuke was one of tenderness and He was more concerned about the state of her heart than the state of her home. When you feel overwhelmed, realize that Christ is speaking to you with that same tenderness. He loves you and wants to mend your brokenness.

"You are worried and upset about many things." Often, we try to fix our problems on our own. We try to fill the holes in our lives with more things that leave us feeling emptier. Jesus wants us to remember that we are to cast out cares worries and anxieties on Him. He wants to restore our balance and give us sure footing.

"But few things are needed- or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her." This comparison of the busy, constantly moving woman in contrast with the eager to learn and sit at the feet of Jesus shows us what Christ values most. The real value isn't found in the temporary relief but in the peace that only God can provide. Christ wants us to lean into Him, to sit at His feet, and heat His words of truth, which are meant to comfort.

Luke 10:42 reminds us that the physical can be taken away from us: our possessions, friends, health, etc.; but the Lord's love, mercy, and grace are eternal.

Father God, make me like Mary, to sit at Your feet. Make me like Martha, ready to serve but also ready to listen when I need to be corrected. Most of all, make me like Jesus, and keep what is truly important at the forefront of my service and devotion to You. Amen
